A stationary north to south surface boundary near the I-65 corridor became the focus for back-building thunderstorms. The storms tapped into an unusually warm and moist air mass for the month of October. The storms produced rainfall amounts of 3-5 inches during the evening hours of October 6th, resulting in flash flooding across northern Blount County. Highway 231 in the city of Blountsville was flooded and impassable and County Road 48 in the town of Summit also flooded with a stranded vehicle.

During the evening of the 6th, a north to south low-level boundary set up along the Interstate 65 corridor that became the focus for back-building thunderstorms and heavy rainfall. Over the course of just a few hours, a wide swath of 6-10 inches of rain occurred. Numerous roads became submerged and impassable. Countless water rescues were performed as travelers either became trapped by or drove into flood waters. Flood water several feet deep impacted parts of neighborhoods and townhomes. Several businesses were damaged by flooding. Extreme runoff also caused creeks and other waterways to rapidly swell. A Flash Flood Watch had already been in place for a few days , highlighting the potential for flooding rainfall. A Flash Flood Warning was issued for Jefferson County, including the city of Birmingham, early in the evening. At least four rounds of thunderstorms occurred, with ongoing and forecast impacts pushing the event to the highest level of flash flooding, a Flash Flood Emergency. Scanner traffic became nonstop with public calls for help and first responder needs for mutual aid and resources. Even after the rain subsided later in the evening, flooding persisted for several more hours.

There was at least one report of a partial landslide in Pelham, sending dirt, rocks, and pine trees onto the road. A Flash Flood Watch had already been in place for a few days , highlighting the potential for flooding rainfall. A Flash Flood Warning was issued for north Shelby County early in the evening. At least four rounds of thunderstorms occurred, with ongoing and forecast impacts pushing the event to the highest level of flash flooding, a Flash Flood Emergency. Scanner traffic became nonstop with public calls for help and first responder needs for mutual aid and resources . Even after the rain subsided later in the evening hours, flooding persisted for several more hours. Two deaths occurred when a vehicle was swept off the roadway and into a creek .

Direct Fatalities: M23VE, F23VE

An upper level trough just west of the Mississippi River on October 3rd become stationary and evolved into a closed upper low by October 5th. The closed upper low remained nearly stationary for 48 hours and before finally lifting northward on October 7th. This system brought a variety of severe weather across Central Alabama over a five day period, including wind damage, large hail and extensive flash flooding. The most impactful flooding taking place during the evening of October 6th. Torrential, training rain and

Several reports and videos were received of brief funnel clouds just north of U.S. Highway 72 in the Madison-Capshaw area. No damage was reported. A Baron Critical Weather Institute mesonet camera atop Rainbow Mountain captured this event as well with a well-defined wall cloud and small funnels. A social media video also showed a rotating wall cloud very low to the ground with a brief funnel in this same general area.

An upper low and weak cold front produced showers and a few thunderstorms during the late afternoon and early evening hours from middle Tennessee into north Alabama. One of the showers produced rotation, exhibited a rotating wall cloud and produced a couple of funnel clouds in western Madison County just north of Madison near Capshaw. The funnels were videoed and sent via social media. A Baron Critical Weather Institute mesonet camera atop Rainbow Mountain captured this event as well with a well-defined wall cloud and small funnels.
